Upcoming Model UN Conference for Middle School Students Celebrates International Diplomacy

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From March 28-30, 1,550 Middle school students led by 200 advisors from 85 schools will attend the Global Classrooms International (GCI) Model UN conference for middle schoolers at the Grand Hyatt Hotel in midtown, with the closing ceremony on taking place at the General Assembly of the UN Headquarters on Saturday March 30. The GCI Middle School conference is the largest middle school Model UN conference in the world — with participating students hailing from China, Georgia, Ghana, Guatemala, Japan, Lebanon, Mexico, Turkey, Uganda, United States and many other countries.

During the conference, students will form 13 committees and simulate the diplomacy processes of the United Nations by debating a wide range of global topics such as the empowerment of indigenous women, tackling the Cholera crisis and implementing international standards for green economics. These simulations allow the delegates to have a memorable Model UN experience by training them in the protocols and procedures of the United Nations that empowers them to forge key leadership qualities and ensuring their successes in an increasingly interconnected and competitive international arena.

"Since 2005, LAU annually celebrates a culture of youth leadership in creative diplomacy, and after acquiring the Global Classrooms International MUN from the UNA - USA, LAU has been organizing mega conferences in New York," said Elie Samia, Assistant Vice President for Outreach and Civic Engagement for LAU's Division of Student Development and Enrollment Management. "This flagship program strongly believes that MUN programs are essential for internal and international security due to its adherence to the UN culture of peace and development."

Beginning in 2016, LAU has headed the esteemed GCI brand in New York City. Simulation programs such as GCI are part of the United Nations larger efforts to establish peace, to secure human rights, and to enable all people to live in dignity by imparting the UN culture onto future generations.

The middle schoolers also will have the chance to interact with key figures in the fields of diplomacy and international relations, including Mr. Elliott Harris, UN Assistant Secretary-General Chief Economist, Department of Economic and Social Affairs (DESA), Ms. Oisika Chakrabarti, Head, Media, and Web Editorial, Public Relations and Communications, UN Women, and Ms. Tracy Brown, Liaison/Public Information Officer & Deputy Director International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), Liaison Office in New York at the United Nations.
